I like the activity everywhere – the area feels safe. I don't go out much at night but I am not afraid to.

I can keep up my Meals on Wheels volunteering once a month and the community centre bus picks me up every Wednesday for an outing. My local church is around the corner and I bring flowers in every week from my little courtyard garden.

I know I can call on my neighbours for help if I need to - my friends are close by and I am very busy living life!


